Who Shall Live and Who Shall Die?

"Who Shall Live and Who Shall Die?" is among the most memorable words in our Rosh ha-Shanah liturgy. Each Rosh ha-Shanah and Yom ha-Kippurim we are reminded of our mortality; in some years our personal and communal experiences make these words particularly acute.

As I write, I hear many news reports of mass death: The most recent is the fear that the Taliban will slaughter and inflict pain and suffering on who-knows-how many. But there have been many others: the pandemic -- 4.5 million deaths, 626,000 in the US, with the Delta variant posing new threats; Haiti has been struck with another earthquake killing more than 2,000 (some remind us that in 2010 between 100,000-160,000 or more died.); forest fires and floods in the US and worldwide kill more; murders week after week in American cities. Innocent life -- gone.

The words "Who Shall Live and Who Shall Die?" touch our soul, reminding us that life is fragile and temporary. The same poem describes life as a passing cloud and a vanishing dream.

But despite the foreboding reality captured in words and reflected in music, the message is decidedly not one of despair.

"You, God, live forever" follows. God is timeless. What?? We were nodding our assent about the frailty of life. God? Is invoking God not a jarring intrusion into the solemn -- and oddly comforting -- reminder that life is short and fragile?

But that is the point-- to save us from our despair. Despair is our adversary. To the contrary! The poem reminds us: Amidst it all, there is more, something eternal, something greater, something which we can embrace and share -- God, the holy, the transcendent. Faith isn't an escape from reality, it is the most real reality -- the one that gives ultimate meaning to us and the opportunity that we may be better and make the world better.

But faith in God is not the end of the story -- "**Teshuvah, t'fillah, u-tzedakah**" -- a *turn* to God, prayer, and

righteousness / justice -- can annul the severity of the verdict. Not only a turn in prayer -- but in attitude and action.

In short, accountability, acting responsibly, acting as adults, is our path. We cannot change the reality that we are mortal, but (1) we can reduce the premature death of innocent life, and (2) we are not only mortal, we are also, with God, eternal as well. We can be larger -- morally -- than we think.

Some advocate making Judaism relevant to us -- and in some aspects it has some merit. But the call of **teshuvah** is the summons to make ourselves relevant to God, to His teachings. We will not be saved by reshaping the wisdom of Torah, but by reshaping ourselves with God and Torah.

And it is not unrelated to many of the terrible deaths we experience and hear. We don't have to enable regimes of death and destruction; we don't have to conceal knowledge of viruses because we want to avoid responsibility; we don't have to prolong death and misery by not being vaccinated; we don't have to assert our personal comfort at the expense of sacrificing our planet and future generations; we don't have to embolden killers by indifference.

God is a God of life -- and of love -- and life cannot be achieved without personal and societal accountability. Acceptance of the death of innocent life, along with its sibling -- indifference -- will mean that "Who Shall Live and Who Shall Die?" will provide the comfort of despair, rather than the inspiration for a holy life, and life itself. "**Teshuvah, t'fillah, u-tzedakah**" can annul the severity of the verdict.

May we all be inspired to live a holy life in 5782. Marian and I wish each of you a **L'shanah tovah**.

I am saddened by the loss of Eric and Elaine Farkas to the congregation, but happy for them stepping into the next stage of their life and moving to Colorado, which they love. I hope that they can return occasionally and perhaps Elaine can be persuaded to make us her cholent.

We had a nice turnout for the Jewish Senior Connection event that Traditional hosted. Mimi Levy did a great presentation. Marty Levy and I, the "Not Ready for Primetime Technicians" did not do a great job, but promise to have learned from this and will improve in the future.

We also had over 20 families represented at our annual Congregational Meeting and approved the slate of officers as presented. I have also made several appointments as Members-at-Large (MAL), but still have four open MAL spots. Please consider talking with me about joining our Board and helping the shul.

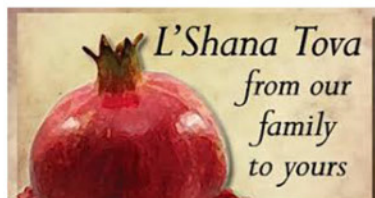

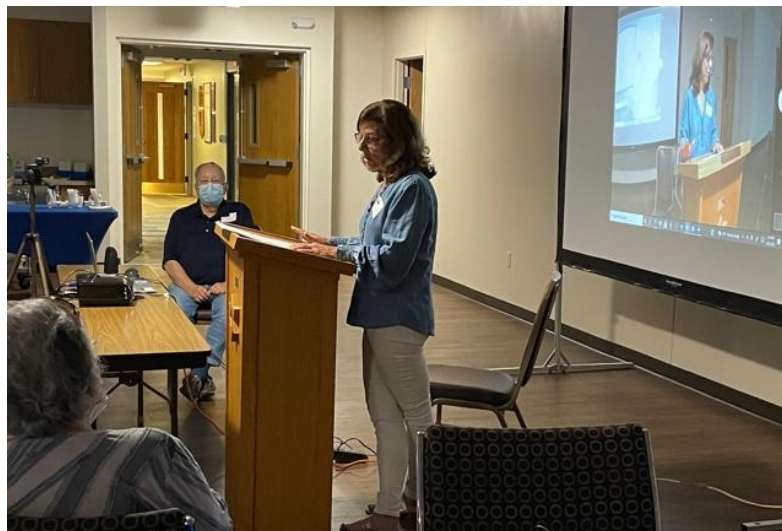

Updates From Our Adopt A Students

Dear Stanley and the people of the Traditional Congregation,

I am happy to write you at the end of my third year. The past year has been special, full of studies and new experiences, but also accompanied by different challenges. When we have started this year, there were still restrictions because of the Coronavirus, and we studied via Zoom classes and even done the exams of the semester on Zoom. At the beginning of the second semester, in February 2021 I have started the clinical training at the rehabilitation unit in Ichiov hospital for 3 months. As I already shared with you, it has been a meaningful experience and I am still processing it and getting new insights. It was an intensive period and treating many patients for the first time also raised many challenges for me, but even though, I handled it on the best side. I loved the opportunity to finally implement all the theoretical knowledge I have gained in two and a half years, and I am very glad for the opportunity to work and learn a lot in such a good place.

In the last week of the clinical training and just before starting the shortened semester, the military operation Shomer HaChomot began. It was very worrying and even scary and of course, made it hard to study or concentrate on anything else. I am glad it ended after a short period and hoping for the silence to keep on. Now we are still studying mostly via zoom until the end of June. Besides the studies, we are also working on our final projects. I am conducting research with another two students regarding the social participation of women who experienced childhood abuse. We are just finishing the meetings with women who volunteered to participate and afterward we will start analyzing the data and make conclusions. At the end of the next semester, we will present our research and hopefully, it will contribute to understanding the needs of this population and maybe even expanding the ways to improve their wellbeing.

Occupational therapy is studied for 3.5 years, and after the summer vacation I will start my last semester. We will have another clinical training, and I hope I will get the opportunity to work with children. I have not decided yet on which domain I would like to specialize in and work in the future. I think it might be in the field of children with special needs or rehabilitation, but until I figure out what is best for me, I will keep the curiosity and try to be exposed and learn as much as I can.

I want to thank you all for your support during this year. It has been a challenging year with many worries. Your support gave me at least financial relief and it means a lot to me. This year taught us a lot about our power when we are united, and your willingness to support on regular and special periods is a great example. I did not know the Jewish population in Missouri state, so I enjoyed reading about your community and keeping in touch with you. I hope you are all well and safe when a lot is going on with the Coronavirus and the tension between Jews and non-Jews around the world and the USA.
